



... FASCINATING NORTH

Come along with us hunting the majestic alaskan moose. Many hunters from all over the world dream of a moose hunt in the undescribable and fascinating backcountry of Alaska. Alaska is bordered by Yukon and British Columbia in Canada, to the east, the Gulf of Alaska and the Pacific Ocean to the south and southwest, the Bering Sea, Bering Strait, and Chukchi Sea to the west and the Arctic Ocean to the north. Alaska's territorial waters touch Russia's territorial waters in the Bering Strait, as the Russian Big Diomede Island and Alaskan Little Diomede Island are only 3 miles (4.8 km) apart. Alaska has a longer coastline than all the other U.S. states combined. Alaska is the largest state in the United States by total area at 663,268 square miles (1,717,856 km2). There are no officially defined borders demarcating the various regions of Alaska, but there are six widely accepted regions. The Interior is the largest region of Alaska; much of it is uninhabited wilderness. Fairbanks is the only large city in the region. Denali National Park and Preserve is located here. Denali is the highest mountain in North America. Southwest Alaska is a sparsely inhabited region stretching some 500 miles (800 km) inland from the Bering Sea. Most of the population lives along the coast. Kodiak Island is also located in Southwest. The massive Yukon-Kuskokwim Delta, one of the largest river deltas in the world, is here. Portions of the Alaska Peninsula are considered part of Southwest, with the remaining portions included with the Aleutian Islands (see below). The North Slope is mostly tundra peppered with small villages. The area is known for its massive reserves of crude oil, and contains both the National Petroleum Reserve-Alaska and the Prudhoe Bay Oil Field. Barrow, the northernmost city in the United States, is located here. The Northwest Arctic area, anchored by Kotzebue and also containing the Kobuk River valley, is often regarded as being part of this region. However, the respective Inupiat of the North Slope and of the Northwest Arctic seldom consider themselves to be one people. More than 300 small volcanic islands make up this chain, which stretches over 1,200 miles (1,900 km) into the Pacific Ocean. Some of these islands fall in the Eastern Hemisphere, but the International Date Line was drawn west of 180° to keep the whole state, and thus the entire North American continent, within the same legal day.



MOOSE



The Alaska moose (Alces alces gigas) or giant moose or Alaskan moose is a subspecies of moose that ranges from Alaska to western Yukon. The Alaska moose is the largest North American subspecies of moose. Alaska moose inhabit boreal forests and mixed deciduous forests throughout most of Alaska and most of Western Yukon. Like all moose species, the Alaska moose is usually solitary but sometimes will form small herds. Typically, they only come into contact with other moose for mating or competition for mates. During mating season, in autumn and winter, male Alaska moose become very aggressive and prone to attacking when

startled. Male Alaska moose can stand over 2.1 m (6.9 ft) at the shoulder, and weigh over 1,400 lb (635 kg). The antlers on average have a span of 1.8 m (5.9 ft). Female Alaska moose stand on average 1.8 m (5.9 ft) at the shoulder and can weigh close to 478 kg (1,054 lb). The largest Alaska moose was shot in western Yukon in September 1897; it weighed 820 kg (1,808 lb), and was 2.33 m (7.6 ft) tall at the shoulder. Alaska moose with the Chukotka moose, matches the extinct Irish elk as the largest deer of all time.





Our Outfitter was born and raised in Alaska. His family has a long tradition of living of the land. They hunt, fish and trap the Alaskan wilderness since several decades. You will hardly find an other outfitter with such a knowledge of the Alaskan bush as them. Our guides are only hunting for old and mature animals to ensure the high quality of the hunts. They will try to meet your needs at any possible way and assist you as good as possible. They have the best equipment and machinery to bring you even to the most remote hunting spots. Guiding is usually based on 1:1. All guides have radios to communicate with base camp.



HUNTING



Moose hunting is done in September. There are two parts of the moose season. The first hunt is between 5th and the 14th ; the second hunt is between the 15th and the 25th. Our primarily hunting area for moose is on the southern half of the Nowitna National Wildlife Refuge, an exclusive guiding area in the central Yukon River basin. This hunting area amounts to approximately 1 million acres of land and over 200 miles of river to hunt. Our Outfitter has lived and worked in this area for over 20 years. This hunting area is a remote wilderness area; it requires a two hour flight to reach the hunting camp. It is an exceptionally scenic area, especially during the hunting season. Beyond the occasional trappers cabin, the region is entirely uninhabited and undeveloped. The fishing is great as well, especially for northern pike and arctic grayling. The hunting is done from canoes along the river or from large lakes. The canoes are motorized, and the camps are portable — meaning we are able to move about as necessary to focus on the better hunting locations. You can expect to find a good number of bulls (1 or 2 per day) and lots of cows with calves. We are typically looking for 60 inch or better bulls. By calling while you're floating, you can often bring the bull right out of the river edge. Other animals available on a trophy fee basis in this area include grizzly, black bear and wolf.
